

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
Something about Gen Z students...

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Role of communication in education

Students frequently highlight communication issues as one of the biggest challenges in education.

Key problems:

- Unclear expectations,
- Mutual misunderstanding,
- Generational differences,
- Lack of feedback clarity.

Impact on education:

☐ Leads to frustration, disengagement and decreased motivation among students (but also among teachers).

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
Activity – The Human Library

The Human Library is an interactive activity designed to foster understanding and improve communication between educators and students. In this exercise, students act as "living books," sharing their personal experiences, challenges, and perspectives on teaching and learning.

How it works:

- •Participants are divided into small groups (2-4 people per group).
- •Each group spends 5-6 minutes with one "book" (student), asking questions and listening to their story.
- •After each round, groups rotate to a new "book" until all have been visited.









Activity – The Human Library

Rules for participants:

- 1. Listen with an open mind.
- 2. Do not criticize or judge.
- 3. Ask respectful and thoughtful questions.
- 4. Allow everyone to speak and share.
- 5. Engage with empathy and understanding.
